- 1. The choices we make on a daily basis-wearing a seat belt, lifting heavy objects correctly or purposely staying out of any dangerous situation-can either ensure our safety or bring about potentially harmful circumstances.
- 2. You and I need to make a decision that we are going to get our lives in order. Exercising self-control, self-discipline and establishing boundaries and borders in our lives are some of the most important things we can do. A life without discipline is one that's filled with carelessness.

- 1. The Indian subcontinent consists of a number of separate linguistic communities each of which shares a common language and culture. The people of India speak many languages and dialects which are mostly varieties of about 14 principal languages. Some Indian languages have a long literary history. Sanskrit literature is 3000 years old and Tamil 2000. India also has some languages that do not have written forms.
- 2. The number of people speaking each language varies greatly. For example, Hindi has more than 250 million speakers but relatively few people speak Andamanese. Although some of the languages are called 'tubal' or 'aboriginal' their populations may be larger than those that speak some European languages. Some ethnic groups in Assam and other parts of eastern India speak languages of the Mon-Khmer group. People in the northern Himalayan region and near the Burmese border speak Sino-Tibetan languages.



Roger Federer: The Man, The Brand

Federer is one of the all-time greats in the tennis world, if not the sports world.



Besides the titles and other competitive wins, another reliable way to gauge the relative success of an athlete is to look at their sponsors. Federer represents brands that send around \$65 million his way every year. He's become the perfect ambassador for companies that want to exude and personify quality.


Some of these relationships with his sponsors go back over a decade, and it's easy to see why. He's done a lot of winning throughout his career, and he continues to win despite being considered old in the world of tennis. At an age when most players are considering retirement, Federer has adjusted his backhand form with the help of coaching and practice. Federer shares his age (37) with just one other player in the men's top 50. Still, he remains on the court, despite experiencing devastating losses and injuries, only to come back and prove wrong. Champions don't allow external factors to prevent them from reaching their goals. Do they have missteps? Yes. But they consider those missteps a temporary setback. In the case of Federer, he uses that time away from the sport to find new ways to reinvent himself.


In an interview he said, "The anger. The sadness. The pressure. I had to deal with so much between 16 and 22 that later on made me the player I am today."

But the analysts were right about one thing: he's not the same player he once was. He's *transformed*. Federer has an incredible amount of natural talent, but that's not what has made him a legend though it's certainly helped.



The present puts into haze the story of India's only two crypto unicorns—CoinDCX and CoinSwitch Kuber. But just a few years ago, these entrepreneurs had muscled their way

through adversities as these are new-world, volatile, unregulated, digital assets operating in a complex ecosystem.




ARGUMENT 'AGAINST' THE STATEMENT

Plastic bags have a bad reputation but banning them could have some surprising negative effects. A ban could have repercussions on consumer convenience and even the economy without making a truly significant improvement to the environment. The common belief is that just about anything is better than the typical thin plastic bag you get from the supermarket, but it's not so simple. There are surprising environmental issues to consider, as well as situations where plastic just works better than paper or cotton. Sometimes, plastic is even being reused in the process (like lining a bathroom trashcan or cleaning up after your dog on a walk). Paper takes up more room in landfills and doesn't exactly disintegrate rapidly. Switching to biodegradable plastic bags might be something to consider, but a ban on plastic bags won't do much for the landfills. If anything, assuming an increase in paper bag usage, it could make the problem worse. Metal water bottles and straws have pitfalls as well. Not only is it more energy-intensive to mine and transport metal than it is to make plastic, but metal water bottles and straws may also harbour pathogens if not cleaned properly.

Plastics may be less recyclable than other products, but landfilling offers a safe and environmentally sound way to manage waste, and space is unlikely to run out even over thousands of years. Since landfills are basically designed to mummify trash, none of it decomposes. To top it off, plastics also take up less landfill space than the other alternatives.


Inability to process fully

The given double bar graph shows the preferences of children in a school in playing different games over the period of six years i.e., from 2014 to 2019.





They belong to the helping verb category, often called as Modal verbs, Modal Auxiliary verbs or Modal auxiliaries. They denote additional information regarding the

function of the main verb and also assist in framing questions and negative expressions. Modals expresses a wide range of meanings such as the degree of certainty of an action, the attitude or the opinion of the speaker and the extent of obligation.

Semi-modals

"Semi-modals" (also called pseudo-modals or quasi-modals) are verbs that share some characteristics of main verbs. All of them have particular functions. Some are:

Semi modals and their functions:

➤ Ought to: Unlike modal verbs," Ought to" is followed by "to", but like modal verbs, it has the same form for all the persons." Ought to" can indicate duty or often is used to criticize the action of another or to talk about things which are desired or ideal

Example: I ought to phone my parents.

You ought to be punctual.

You ought to visit your friend once in a while.

➤ Dare: Dare as a semi-modal verb is used in present tense and negative forms, and the verbs after it must be in bare form (infinitive without "to") It denotes the meaning of being bold and courageous. In negative sentence," dare not" is used.

Example: I dare not disturb him.

➤ Need: Need is a semi-modal verb because in some ways it is like a modal verb in other ways like a main verb. We use need mostly in the negative form to indicate that there is no obligation or necessity to do something.

Example: You needn't take off your shoes.

➤ Used to: As a modal it denotes two meanings: a) To express a discontinued habit, a situation that occurred in past and exists no more.

Example: Till last year, he used to come daily.

b) To express something that existed in past.

Example: This place used to be clean before

➤ Had Better: Had –better is a semi-modal verb phrase that is used to give strong advice in English. It is often considered a semi-modal verb because it follows the conventions of other modal verbs.

Example: He'd better be serious about the work.

➤ Have to: "Have to" is the most commonly used modal of obligation. We use "have to" to talk about obligation, things that are necessary to do, or to give advice about things that are a good idea to do.

Example: I have to go now.

REPORTED SPEECH

- ▶ We use reported speech **when we want to tell someone what someone said**. We usually use a reporting verb (e.g. say, tell, ask, etc.) and then change the tense of what was actually said in direct speech.
- ➤ You report with a reporting verb.
- ▶ Verbs in the present simple change to the past simple; the present continuous changes to the past continuous; the present perfect changes to the past perfect; *can* changes to *could*; *will* changes to *would*; etc.
- Apart from changing the tense of the verb, you also have to think about changing other things, like pronouns and adverbs of time and place.
- We often use ask + if/whether, then change the tenses as with statements. In reported questions we don't use question forms after the reporting verb.
- ► There are lots of other reporting verbs like *promise*, *remind*, *warn*, *advise*, *recommend*, *encourage* which you can choose, depending on the situation. But *say*, *tell* and *ask* are the most common.
- ▶ Reporting the narration is done two ways Direct or Indirect. The CBSE Class 10 Grammar syllabus includes this reporting in dialogue forms. Answer:

The young bird never had the confidence that its wings would support him in the air when it flies. As threatened, when the parent bird stopped providing food, he was hungry and the sight of the food made him forget where he was. He dived at the fish his mother was carrying. When he dived, he fell outwards and downwards into space. When it realised it is in the air, it got terrified but as wind rushed against his breast feathers and his stomach and wings, he could feel the tips of his wings cutting through the air. He was not falling how. He was soaring and understood his wings can carry him to the heights. He thus overcame his fear.

ii. The young seagull "failed to muster up the courage to take that plunge". In what way can the reference to the 'plunge' here be both literal and metaphorical? Explain.

ANSWER: The literal meaning of plunge is 'a sudden jump'. Metaphorically 'plunge' can be understood as diving deep into something new. So, this was applied to him correctly in both the senses. Literally, he had to dive from the hill Cliff in order to fly in the air and metaphorically he dived into a new act of flying.

iii. The 'fight or flight response', that is, to stay and face a situation or run from it- is an automatic reaction to an event perceived as stressful or harmful. How would you evaluate the young gull's response to finding himself off the ledge?

ANSWER: When he realised that he dived off the ledge, he was full of terror. His heart stopped beating momentarily. But soon after he felt his Wings open outwards. He could feel the wind on his chest feathers. He was no more falling headway down the sea. He realised that he could fly like his family. He flew with all might and pride and started feeling the joy of being on his own.

Here we find the father being not too much involved like the mother but he does care for the child. This shows the difference.

- In this lesson, Anne talks about being lonely and having no one to talk to despite being surrounded by family and around 30 people whom she called her "friends".
- She takes the decision of writing her feelings in a diary. It is unusual for her to write in a diary but she is really in need of a true friend. Thus, she decides to name her diary "kitty"
- She describes her family and early childhood when they all migrated, her early schooling. After giving a brief account of her background, she comes to the present day where she tells us about the result day.
- Everyone in the class is nervous about their result and boys are even making bets. Anne was quite sure about herself and her friends.
- She had a good equation with all the teachers except her maths professor, who was constantly annoyed at her for her talking habits.

INTRODUCTION

- A FARSCICAL one-act play written by the Russian story writer and dramatist Anton Chekhov in 1888–89.
- The play is about the tendency of rich families to hunt ties with other wealthy families, to extend their estates by encouraging marriages that observe economic sense.



CHARACTER TRAITS

Lomov:

- Suitor for Natalya his neighbour
- Hypochondriac feels often that he is going to fall sick
- who wants to get married for the sake of appearances.
- Though he doesn't seem to love Natalya but decides to marry her because she's the best woman available.
- Not a good speaker as he has difficulty to express his view to the point, Because of his tendency to digress, he becomes involved in silly arguments What seems most important to him is maintaining a superior appearance, which is also true of the other two characters.

Natalva:

- Natalya is a strong-willed woman who is more effective than Lomov in speaking clearly and getting to the point.
- She too is focused on maintaining a superior appearance. As a result, she insists that Oxen Meadows belongs to her family and not to Lomov. She also argues that her dog is better than Lomov's dog.
- She feels the burden of being a potential if not actual spinster and, thus, desperately wants to marry Lomov.
- She is concerned for being right yet talkative and short tempered.

Chubukov

- Father of Natalya
- Chubukov seems happy about the potential marriage between Lomov and Natalya
- However, he sees marriage in a mercenary way, referring to Lomov's proposal as a merchant buying goods. For him, the match is advantageous as a good business arrangement for both families

A loving brother yet values and maintains a superior appearance. As a result, he gets embroiled in the inane arguments between Lomov and Natalya.

He is so preoccupied with marrying her daughter to a wealthy man that he ignores Lomov's ailments and illnesses.

MAIN POINTS

- The poet was in a sorrowful mood and was sitting under a hemlock tree.
- A crow was sitting on the same tree.
- The crow perches on the top of the tree, shakes down dust of snow.
- He was awakened from his thoughts when a small particle of snow fell on him.
- A simple act of the crow shook off the pessimism and changed poet's mood

THEME

- The simple things we do for others can make all the difference.
- Just think about those random acts of kindness we do and how much they brighten a
 person's day and sometimes changes their future.
- The poem describes a very simple happening in very simple words.

MESSAGE

- This poem tells us that sometimes even a small incident may prove to be of larger significance.
- The poet is upset in the beginning of the poem but a small incident of falling of snow changes his mood totally.

• In the end of the poem the poet feels relaxed and thankful to the nature for saving his day from being wasted.

Poetic Devices

Rhyme Scheme: abab

Imagery: Frost uses simple imagery like a crow scattering snow from hemlock tree, and 'dust of snow' falling on the poet to depict the positive effect of nature on the poet.

<u>Alliteration</u>: Alliteration is the occurrence of the same sound that is used in the beginning of the closely placed words.

Symbolism: Symbolism is the use of symbols to signify ideas by giving them symbolic meaning that is different from their literal meaning.

The 'crow' and 'hemlock tree'. The poet has used these as a symbol to show the emotions like dejection, gloom and depression. Also, he has used these as symbols to show that these 'inauspicious' things of nature can also change a person's mood and mind.

The poet is having a bad day and he is clear about that. However, to make us understand the severity of his sullen mood, he introduces us to the symbol of the hemlock tree. Hence, the hemlock tree, from which the poison is said to be made, is a symbol of death. The next symbol that the poet introduces to us is that of the crow. The crow is an ambiguous symbol and could stand for many things. Generally, the crow is considered to be the ugliest among all birds. Hence, it could be another sight to degrade the poet's mood once again.

<u>Inversion</u>: When the structure of a sentence is changed by the poet to create rhyme, the poetic license is called inversion. In stanza 1, the poetic device 'inversion' is used.

Enjambment: In enjambment, the same sentence continues to the next line without the use of any punctuation marks.

This poem is a very good example of this poetic device. It has been used throughout the poem. The lines of stanzas flow to next line without any punctuations.

<u>Metaphor</u>: This poetic device is used when a covert comparison is made between two different things or ideas. In this poem, the poet uses the device of metaphor in the 3rd line of the 1st stanza, when he compares the mass of snowflakes atop the hemlock tree with dust.

Synecdoche: This poetic device is used in many ways to represent one thing with the help of an entirely different one. In this poem, the poet uses this device to represent the whole in the 1st line of the 2nd stanza. He says that his "heart" has undergone a change of mood because the crow has

made the snowflakes from the hemlock tree rain down on him. However, he is now experiencing a better mood as a result of the actions of the crow.

Assonance: The prominence of a vowel sound throughout a line is called assonance.

In stanza 1, line 2, "Shook down on me", 'O' sound is prominent

Ans: It is quite true that our attitude to a situation determines everything, including our state of mind. Optimistic attitude brings us lasting happiness; on the contrary, negative attitude results in worry, tension and depression. In the poem Dust of Snow, the poet's mood was transformed by the nature. As he was enjoying an evening walk on a wintry evening, a crow inadvertently threw some snow on him while he was passing under a tree. This uplifted the poet's mood which had been melancholy for some personal reason. The poet took the falling of snow as healthy; if he had taken it negatively, he would have been further depressed. So, it is better to look at the world through optimism than negativity

The poet has succeeded in giving valuable information in a light-hearted manner. What creates the desired effect? Highlight its importance in present-day life?

Ans: Truly, Frost has used simple language to drive home a very significant message, that little things some times, have a big impact. An easy, uncomplicated language, coupled with unusual visual imagery and brevity of words create the desired effect. The poet's bitterness finds reflection even in the environment around him. The noisy 'dark row, the poisonous hemlock and the icy snow around –all are essentially depressing images. However, despite the negativity, when the crow shakes down the dust of snow onto the poet, it also shakes off some of the poet's regretful thoughts.

Today, when all of us live in stressful atmospheres, the poem teaches us to gain happiness from little things.

2. FIRE AND ICE

-ROBERT FROST

Main points

- The poem represents the idea of destruction of the world.
- Some people believe the world will end in fire, while others believe that it will end in ice.
- 'Desire', represented by fire, can lead to destruction through the unchecked accumulation of things.
- Hate' represented by fire, can also lead to destruction, by tearing apart bonds between people.

Theme

The poem "Fire and Ice" by Robert Frost is about the hypothetical end of the world with the speaker asserting that it will be destroyed either by fire or by ice. Fire means the burning desire for the material things and ice means coldness that emerges in humans because of the desires and materialistic life. The central idea around which the entire poem revolves is that only love, equality, mutual understanding and sympathy for one and all can help in establishing peace on the Earth.

Poetic Devices

Rhyme scheme — stanza 1 is abaa while for stanza 2 it is ababa.

Symbolism – Symbolism is the use of symbols to signify some ideas by giving them symbolic meaning different from their literal meaning.

Fire – symbolizes desire with human emotions like lust, fury, cruelty, greed etc..

Ice – symbolizes the hatred with cold feelings of humans such as rigidity, jealousy, indifference, intolerance etc..

Personification —Personification is to assign human qualities to non-living things. In this poem, 'fire' and 'ice' are capable to destroy the earth.

Metaphor – It is a literary device that is used to make a covert comparison without using the words 'like 'or 'as '.

Here, the poet has used the terms 'fire' and 'ice' as metaphors for the human emotions related to desire and hatred.

Anaphora — Anaphora is the repetition of a word or expression at the start of two or more consecutive lines.

For example:

'Some say' is repeated at the start of the lines 1 and 2.

Alliteration —Alliteration is repetition of the same sound used at the beginning of the nearly placed words.

Example: The sound of 's' in some say, 'f' in "Favour fire", and 'w' in "world will".

Enjambment— It is a line or clause that does not come to an end at a line break, rather it moves over to the next line. This device has been used prominently in the poem.

For Example:

"From what I've tasted of desire

I hold with those who favour fire"

Antithesis – Fire is the antithesis of ice. Two contrasting and directly opposite destructive forces have been the hallmark of this poem; Fire and Ice'.

The more you try to satisfy them, the more they grow. There is no end to it. They spread rapidly like fire and ruin your whole life. On the other hand, 'ice' according to the poet, stands for hatred. One becomes insensitive and indifferent towards the feelings of others. One becomes selfish and sometimes cruel as well. The poet says that both fire and ice are growing with such a rapid speed that the world would soon perish either way, in fire or in ice.



JOHN BERRYMAN

- The main **theme** of the poem is Loss and Acceptance.
- John Berryman describes the theme using an incident of a little boy. The little boy's ball was lost somewhere and couldn't get it back.
- The boy is now fully saddened due to the loss of his only possession the ball.

- The poet, who witnessed this incident, left the boy alone instead of consoling him.
- The poet indirectly lets the boy understand and accept the truth of his loss and to move strongly.
- Loss of things is a part and parcel of life. Humans should not lose hope and should keep moving forward with courage.
- The poet conveys the readers of the poem through various lines that the loss is inseparable in human life. The following lines express the same:
 - A dime, another ball, is worthless.
 - People will take balls, Balls will be lost always, little boy,
 And no one buys a ball back. Money is external.

(b) Poetic Devices used in the poem 'The Ball Poem':

- It is written in a **free-verse** (blank-verse) style. No rhyme scheme is followed.
- The ball is used as a **symbol** of boy's childhood days which are gone now.
- The loss of the ball symbolises the loss of the childhood days.
- Loss of the ball teaches the boy to accept the loss and to cope up with it. In other way, it symbolises that the boy is now grown up and has to be matured.
- 'All his young days into the harbour where His ball went': This line is the example of Metaphor. Using this technique (poetic device), the poet compares the lost childhood of the boy and the lost ball.
- **Alliteration** is used in the following lines of the poem:
 - What, what is he to do?
 - And no one <u>buys</u> a <u>ball back</u>.
- The word 'BALL' is repeatedly used by John Berryman in the poem. This technique is called **Repetition**. The poet uses the word on the surface to describe the loss of the ball. He also uses it as a symbol for the loss of childhood.
- The phrase 'desperate eyes' is an example of a transferred epithet. It tells us that the boy himself is sad, and not merely his eyes.
- **Imagery** is also used in the following line:

I saw it go

Merrily bouncing, down the street, and then

Merrily over—there it is in the water!

He is learning, well behind his desperate eyes



She imagines herself to be an orphan roaming on the streets and making designs on the soft dust with

her bare feet and thus she enjoys herself the forbidden sweet freedom in a world of golden 'silence'.

6.Her mother finds fault with her for eating chocolate as it results in acne.

She scolds her for not looking at her when she talks to her.

Amanda imagines herself to be Rapunzel who does not have to care about anything.

She imagines living peacefully in the tower.

She feels that she will never let her hair down so that nobody can come into her tower to hurt her.

- The small twigs of the tree become tough and the branches move under the enclosed roof
- The night time moon is shining and the smell of leaves and lichen is spreading in the room

- The poet is in the room but the roots, leaves and branches are continuing to struggle and free themselves
- The struggling trees have come out, breaking the glass and are marching towards the forests in triumph
- The poem is synonymous of nature and also the nature of being womanhood breaking away from the shackles that bind them

THEME OF THE POEM

The poem depicts two types of conflicts – the conflict between nature and humans, and the other between human beings themselves. Man has destroyed nature by cutting down trees. Growing a few trees inside the house does not compensate the loss. The trees that are growing inside the four walls of the house feel cramped and try to break free. The trees that break free fill the forest by morning.

The trees also symbolise women who are imprisoned within the four walls of the house and feel suffocated. The women are desperate to move out and exert themselves in a new and open environment. It is also the demand for freedom of all human beings who are under some form of subjugation or the other.

The poet feels that human beings have snatched the freedom of trees by taking them into their homes and growing them there. They are deprived of their natural setting – the forest. However, they are now in the process of going back to the forest. The poet portrays the struggles that the trees undergo to be free. The poet too seems to be quite happy with their departure, though she does not mention it.

The other perspective is that the poem showcases the struggle that women undergo to break the shackles of the patriarchal society. They are confined to the four walls of the home and are made to believe that is their world. As women become enlightened, they struggle to come out of the prison they are in and move out into the world. They succeed in coming out. The struggles that the trees undergo can also be interpreted as the struggles undertaken by the oppressed everywhere around the world.

2.'Departure is painful '. So is the departure of the trees painful for the poet. What will happen after their departure?

Ans: The departure of someone close to us is always a painful affair. So is the case with trees. When we plant a sapling, we take care of it ensuring that it grows up properly. These saplings add beauty to our surroundings. But once they grow, the branches start spreading out and they occupy more space. The roots may create cracks in the floor and the leaves will stretch out seeking sunlight. The branches become stronger and thicker. The close confines of the house are no longer conducive for their growth. So they are to be moved out of the house.

The trees are no more cramped in close quarters but are now under the open sky where they breathe freely and are welcomed by the winds. The moon looks like a broken mirror when seen through the branches of the trees. The poet will feel lonely without the presence of trees, but the lingering smell of leaves and lichen keep her company and keep reminding her of what was there and is no longer there.

Ans: The poem 'The Trees' is based on the conflict between man and nature. Nature has always been a great resource and provided man with everything that he needs. However, the greed, the foolishness and arrogance of man has tested the patience of nature. When things go beyond the control of nature, it shows its displeasure in the form of floods, droughts and famines. The recent pandemic was also a warning signal that if we do not pause and think, worse will follow. Human greed has led to deforestation and the forests area has drastically reduced. Birds, animals and insects suffer without the presence of trees. Many of the diseases man suffers of these days is the result of the destruction of nature.

Any attempt by man to bring nature under his control is going to end in failure. Uprooting trees from the forests and putting them indoors, in glasshouses is futile. The trees are going to free themselves from the tyranny of human beings. They will then return to their original homes, thereby

Poem in detail:

<u>Central Idea:</u> Everything created whether small or big has its specific importance. Usually, we underestimate talented persons but they prove themselves by their wits and right actions. We should never look down upon others. Moreover, right and timely actions are always beneficial.

Theme:

The theme of the poem is that everyone has his own capabilities and should never be judged on the basis of his appearance. In the poem, Belinda and all pets she owns boast about their bravery. Belindawas as strong as a barrel full of bears, Ink and Blink were brave and fearless enough to chase lions down the stairs and Mustard considered itself as brave as an angry tiger.

However Custard never boasted about its might and power and instead always cried for a nice andsafe cage. Hence Belinda and all her pets used to make fun of Custard. They would tease him mercilesslyand call him bad names. But Custard never reacted and rather accepted what they said.

But, when the pirate attacks the house of Belinda, all the so-called brave animals run away to savetheir lives though Belinda keeps crying for help. At this time, Custard comes forward at once and faces the pirate. The pirate tries to kill him by firing bullets. However they do not hit him and Custard eats him up.

Message:

The story tells us that we should never judge a person on the basis of his looks or what others sayabout him. Every person is unique and capable in his own way.

MAIN POINTS:

- 1.Belinda lived in a little white house with her pets (A little black kitten whose name is Ink, A little grey mouse named Blink, A dog named Mustard because he is yellow in colour. A coward dragonwhose name is Custard and they have a red wagon.

- 3.Belinda tries to tickle Custard so that he becomes expressive and bold. His other friends tease him and call him innocent and coward.

The poet has aptly used many images in the poem to make reader clearly understand what actually they mean in the context of the poem. The mouth of the Dragon is compared to a fireplace. A fireplace is the place in a house where the sticks are burnt to keep oneself warmfrom cold climate. The nose is compared to a chimney showing how the nose of the dragon was fuming with smoke. Belinda was as barrel of bears . Bears are powerful animals. Barrel indicates container or the front tubular part of a gun . This shows that Belinda had the explosive power of many bears. Custard cried for a nice safe cage. Cage here signifies refuge or a safe place. Custard snorted like an engine. Custard angrily sprang into action like an engine on move. The image of Robin shows the way how it would charge at its prey.

It is said that a book should never be judged by seeing its cover. All the pets including Belinda fall into this folly of making quick judgments - as they see Custard cowardly, ridiculing the Dragon and calling it names.

They continued to tease the dragon until the time of the arrival of the pirate. The so called powerful and brave pets of Belinda run away after seeing the pirate. The only creature who faces the pirate boldly is the Dragon. The dragon charges at him angrily and gobbles up thepirate completely. Immediately the pets and Belinda run towards the dragon to celebrate thesuccess. Now they have come to realise the real strength of the Dragon.

10. FOR ANNE GREGORY

Poet: William Butler Yeats

KEY POINTS

- The poem "For Anne Gregory" is in the form of a conversation between a young man and a young woman.
- The young man speaks on how the world really works. He believes that the world usually places a lot of importance on outward beauty.
- He claims that young men are attracted to Anne Gregory because of her honey-coloured hair. In other words, her looks.
- Such men love her only because of her beauty and will never love her for who she really is.
- The young woman listens to his words and thinks of a solution. She feels all she has to do is dye her hair black or brown or carrot. Then, men will love her for herself and not just for her yellow hair.
- The young man seems amused by this response. He tells her about an old man he met the previous night.
- This religious man had found a book which proved that only God could love a person for who she or he is. In other words, men will always look for beauty.

THEME: The major themes of this poem are:

- 6. Conventional ideas of 'Beauty'-Men's judgement of Beauty
- 7. According to the poet, the way the society perceives 'beauty' is quite stereotypical.
- 8. The society considers women with lighter hai, (having good looks), to be more attractive to men, and are easy to fall in love with.
- 9. Yeats criticises the world's superficial understanding of beauty.
- 10. Their perception of beauty goes by physical appearance and likely to miss the hidden, inner beauty.
- 11. The young man is protective of Anne and warns her about men and their idea of beauty.

Metaphor: The phrase 'honey-coloured ramparts' is an example of metaphor. (Anne Gregory's hair is compared to the walls of a fort. Just like the walls of a fort hide and protect the city, the hair hides the true self of Anne Gregory.)

Apostrophe: In this poem, Yeats is seen talking to Anne Gregory (addressing her as if she were present) but the readers do not see her at any point in the poem.

Alliteration: The phrase 'your yellow hair' is an example of alliteration. (Yeats uses alliteration to enhance the musical quality of his poem.)

Repetition: In the poem, the phrase 'yellow hair' has been repeated many times (By repeating this phrase, the poet is reinforcing the notion of external beauty.) The word 'despair' is also repeated in the poem. (It emphasises the young men's feelings for Anne Gregory.)

Rhyme Scheme: The rhyme scheme of the poem is abcbdb.



- Two attendants chase him in the morning. He becomes homeless again.
- He enters a theatrical company to use the clothes and accessories to cover himself particularly his invisible face and catches a train to Iping village
- The money of loot doesn't last long. He steals money from a Clergyman's desk to pay rent.
- When the scientist pays rent, suspicion falls on him.
- Mrs. Hall finds the room of the scientist open. She wants to look into the room. A hat springs up and hits on her face.
- The chair of the room becomes alive and forces Mr. And Mrs. hall out of the room.
- Suddenly Griffin appears from nowhere.

- When Mr. and Mrs. Hall enquire how he got into a locked room, Griffin gets angry.
- He removes the bandages and false nose. Now he is headless.
- The constable is called to arrest the headless man but he is wounded by the invisible scientist.

Theme

The theme of this lesson is that excessive greed can have unintended and disastrous consequences as is evidently reflected in the story. It is the description of a brilliant scientist, Griffin, who degenerated himself into a lawless person. Griffin discovered that the human body could become transparent and invisible. But he misused his great discovery. He did not use the power of invisibility for the welfare of society and humanity at large. He misused it to threaten, trouble and beat innocent persons and rob them. He made illegal entries in stores and shops and stole things from there. He committed a burglary in a clergyman's house in Iping. Griffin remained invisible or unseen only when he was without clothes. If he puts on clothes, he lost his invisibility and could be seen by the people around him.

Values:

The lesson gives a message that misuse of science and its great discoveries can make even a brilliant scientist like Griffin a monster and a threatening lawless person.





Nobody knew how to face an invisible man.

A word of appreciation by the teacher motivates a student and boosts up his/her morale and confidence. We expect our teachers treat the children with compassion and sympathy. Their love for their students is a source of inspiration for them.

In real life also for example Bill Gates and Sachin Tendulkar have given the credit for their success to their teachers. An ideal teacher treats the backward child with love and affection and encourage them to join the mainstream of the society. He does not mock at their disabilities, instead gives them hope that they can be as good as the other children by motivating and uplifting him. The role of teachers in society is both significant and valuable

as they mould the meek and backwards into a bold and an intelligent one.

- The historian presents the story to the children of the 25th century.
- Think Tank, the ruler of Mars (and her two moons) decides to invade the earth and sends a team from Mars Space Control to earth.
- Think Tank is described as 'great and mighty', 'the most powerful and intelligent creature in the whole universe'; and insists on being addressed with a whole string of epithets.
- He comes across as being vain, arrogant, domineering, boastful, short tempered and far from intelligent.
- He has a huge, egg-shaped head and considers the people of earth to be ugly, because they have 'tiny' heads.
- The space crew from Mars land on earth and take shelter in the Centreville public library.
- The crew consists of Captain Omega, Lieutenant Iota and Sergeant Oop.

- They think that the library is a storage barn or a haberdashery.
- Think Tank is of the opinion that it is an eatery because he thinks Earth creatures are always eating, he thinks that the books are sandwiches and asks his captain to eat a book and confirm his opinion.
- The crew displays reluctance, but finally the Sergeant tries to eat a book and gives up.
- On Noodle's suggestion, they think that the books could be communication sandwiches. Comically, they try to listen to the books to get information and decide that the frequency is not right. Then they think it is a visual communication device in code.
- They take vitamins to increase their intelligence and try to decipher a book. The book that they pick is 'Mother Goose' a book of nursery rhymes.
- Oop thinks that the rhymes are funny but Think Tank understands everything literally and comes to the conclusion that humans have discovered how to grow crops of rare metals and high explosives, that they have taught domesticated animals to appreciate music and to use space techniques. He comes to the conclusion that human beings could launch an interplanetary attack using millions of cows. Then they read the rhyme on Humpty Dumpty, whose pictures are just like Think Tank. When they read that Humpty Dumpty had a great fall and could not be put together again, Think Tank gives up the idea of invading earth and decides to leave for Alpha Centauri, a 100 million miles away.
- This is how the historian says a dusty old book of nursery rhymes saved the earth from a Martian invasion.

<u>Theme</u>: The story is about a planned Martian invasion of the earth in the year 2040, in which the Martians give up their plan because they misinterpret the text in a book of nursery rhymes. The ruler concludes that the Martians are in danger and orders an evacuation of the planet.

Long Answer Question

1. The title, 'The Book That Saved the Earth' is suitable to the story. Discuss.

The story is set in the future, in the twenty-fifth century. It describes an event in the twenty-first century, a planned invasion of the earth.

Think-Tank, the Ruler of Mars, plans an invasion of the earth, and wishes to bring it under his 'generous rulership', though he thinks of it only as a 'ridiculous planet' and a 'ball of mud'. He sends a manned spaceship to earth and communicates with his crew. He finds them in a library, unable to understand where they are. They look to him for guidance and he tells them they are in some kind of crude refreshment stand. He thinks that the books are sandwiches and orders the Captain to eat one for confirmation. After failed attempts and gentle persuasion in the right direction, he finally understands that books contain information that they need to decipher.

The crew members take special vitamins to read and understand the text in one of the books. The book that they read is 'Mother Goose', a book of rhymes. It talks of silver bells, cockle shells and pretty maids growing in the garden. It also mentions a cat playing the fiddle, a dog laughing and a cow jumping over the moon. This alarms Think-Tank as he thinks that people on earth have reached such a high level of civilisation that even their domesticated animals have a sense of humour, musical culture and space techniques.

Then, they come upon the rhyme describing Humpty Dumpty's great fall. The picture of Humpty Dumpty looks just like Think-Tank and drives him to a panic. He concludes that the earthlings are after him and mean to capture Mars. He abandons the plan to invade the earth and decides to flee Mars. He is so frightened that he orders an evacuation of Mars. Thus, the book, 'Mother Goose' saves the earth!

Science-fiction generally deals with futuristic and imaginative concepts such as advanced science and technology, space exploration, aliens, interplanetary warfare, parallel universes and time travel.

The Indian pharmacy industry is flourishing overseas, touching almost every part of the world. With low cost, speed and high quality advantage, India is gearing up to become the hub for contract research and manufacturing. Having a competitive edge is, one thing and maintaining it is another. Canada provides tax benefits up to 6 percent for research carried out within the country. Others like Korea and China without a large pool of scientists make up by facilitating foreign research in every conceivable way. India does not do any of this and faces many hurdles - diseases that it has been inflicted with since independence like Malaria and TB while Indian companies have only focused on reverse engineering blockbuster drugs from MNCs, overseas scientists have displayed little interest in researching subcontinent specific diseases as there are more profits and public interest in lifestyle drugs such as obesity which in turn fund their research. In the interest of Indian research industry a decision must be taken quickly on the implementation of data protection laws.

India is one of the few countries where data exclusivity provisions are not prevalent. Data protection is a contentious issue, wholly debated by the government and the industry. A pharma company wishing to market a drug is required to submit data to the drug controller to show that the drug is both effective andsafe. The first (originator) company that makes the application for marketing approval has to submit its data relating to the clinical trials to the drug controller, who once satisfied that the drug is safe and effective will register it. Another drug company wishing to market the same drug only requires to show a bio-equivalence company. Thus, as per the prevailing laws, the regulator in India can rely on an innovator's data to approve the competitor's product. While the system in general is responsible for maintaining the necessary secrecy, itis not accountable for the same—the competitor gets an unfair advantage over the innovator even when he is clandestinely abusing an innovator's intellectual property. Consequently research-based pharma companies are being forced to undertake vital clinical trials abroad. Huge expenditures are incurred overseas, draining precious foreign exchange when this could be done at home at a fraction of the cost.

The product patent law protections required by the TRIPS agreement and brought about by the 2005 amendment to the Patent Act require India to protect undisclosed test data from disclosure and unfair commercial use by competitors. Effective 2005, Indian companies can no longer copy patent-protected foreign drugs. Some negate the necessity to make data exclusivity a law. They argue that the advocates of making it a law, the MNCs, want the data to be protected absolutely for a period of 5 years. However, incase certain drugs are not available or unaffordable, should the government for the common good not be able to exercise power to get another company to make such drugs?



Similar technology can also be used to combat inherited diseases and even cancer. Elsewhere, gene therapy experiments are using the body's immune system to fight cancer through re-engineering our cells. Technology has inarguably improved science, health, communications, and transport. However, technology has not necessarily corresponded to increased economic productivity. Indeed, many of the most technologically advanced countries have seen productivity stagnate and stall, as discussed in growing inequality and opportunity. 

In support of the decision:

The given information illustrates the options Shilpi would weigh in order to take the right decision about living in a hostel. With availability of an economical and healthy environment, more social interaction between the students, provision for developing hobbies and a separate room for study, she will be assured of a comfortable stay in the hostel. Though she has to be extra careful about the personal belongings as she has to share a common living space, she may be free from domestic duties.

Good opportunities for learning about different cultures and a scope to develop optimistic nature, a great sense of responsibility and learn to take decisions of her own will help her to lead an independent life. Mutual cooperation among the hostellers, sympathy and love for each other will help Shilpi to live in the hostel peacefully even though there is less privacy and she may waste time in enjoyment and merry making. The strengths and opportunities work in favour of Shilpi in taking a resolute decision to

stay in the hostel. Taking up this opportunity will allow her to stay comfortably in a hostel which provides a good and low-priced accommodation. (192 words)

Against the decision:

The given information indicates Shilpi's dilemma about seeking accommodation in a hostel.

Though equipped with all the facilities, ragging by seniors may pose a great concern of safety and security for an innocent girl like Shilpi. Sharing of a common living space indicates that she has to be cautious and take extra care of her belongings. Such an unsafe environment may affect her adversely. Living conditions are also far less comfortable than at home. Common living space and things indicate that there may be less privacy and hygiene too.

Since her family members cannot live with her in the hostel and guide her, she may waste her time in enjoyment and merry making with the hostellers. This may prove detrimental as it may increase her expenditure too. Restricted use of mobiles, laptops or PCs may be a stumbling block in the journey of her education and in realising her dream. The weakness and threats outweigh the strengths, in the case of Shilpi. So, it is recommended that Shilpi does not get the accommodation in the hostel. (176 words)

Children who have behavioral problems and children with developmental delays or disabilities may be especially affected by the quality of the teacher-child relationships. (2009, 265)

Argument FOR the subject of the statement:

The core of education is the relationship between the teacher and the student, and the extent to which that relationship nurtures the longing of the child to matter in the world, and the longing of the teacher to nurture and fulfill that desire. Improving students' relationships with teachers has important, positive and long-lasting implications for both students' academic and social development. Solely improving students' relationships with their teachers will not produce gains in achievement. However, those students who have close, positive and supportive relationships with their teachers will attain higher levels of achievement than those of others.

Improving teacher-student relationships is only the first step toward meeting students' emotional and relational needs. A teacher should also work on producing a caring

community of learners. Such efforts improve the nature of interactions among students and promote students' engagement in school. It is widely agreed that trust between teacher and student plays an important role in academic education at school. When we think about what characterises a good learning environment that promotes the student's acquisition of knowledge and the improvement of intellectual capacities, trust will certainly come to the mind.

Argument AGAINST the statement:

Positive interaction creates peaceful environment, but negative interaction leads to instability. Close teacher -child attachments are counterproductive and usually lead to poor classroom management and control, low student attainment levels, and eventual disrespect from the same students. Teachers and students must respect the boundaries that separate them. These boundaries serve a very important purpose.

A negative interaction can cause a student or class of students to experience significant setbacks. They can create notable learning gaps and cultivate an atmosphere of indiscipline and chaos.

Some students and teachers take time to develop teacher- student relationship. A lack of awareness on the part of the instructor leads to poor teacher-student relationships. Not all students respond the same way to lessons, and some require personalized educational practices. For example, a teacher might assume that a student who never volunteers in class is apathetic or disengaged. In reality, the student might be a visual learner who doesn't respond well to lecture-style teaching.

Relationship troubles between teachers and students surface when a teacher doesn't consider an individual student's educational needs. Personality, family backgrounds, thought processes, learning styles, priorities, maturity levels and academic goals influence each student's ability to learn and connect with teachers. Teachers must be wise to view each student as an individual who deserves one-on-one attention and specialized, focused instruction whenever possible.

Teachers should always try to show appreciation, respect, kindness and patience. Displaying flaring tempers, yelling at students and expressing frequent irritation results in stressful and unhealthy teacher-student relationships.
